From the Director...

Where has the summer gone? Before long it will be time to pack our bags, our roses and grooming tools, and head to the Cleveland area for the ARS Fall National Rose Show and Convention. As rosarians from across the country will be attending this exciting event, we have an opportunity to extend some of our famous Buckeye hospitality. The Forest City and Western Reserve Rose Societies under the leadership of General Chairman, Bob Choate, have been working long and hard preparing for this national event and have planned something for everyone. In addition to the rose show, there will be a dinner cruise on Lake Erie, a tour of Holden Arboretum, nationally known speakers, an arrangement seminar and workshop, and the awards banquet. I encourage all Buckeye rosarians to attend at least part of this special event.

The Buckeye District Fall Business Meeting will be held in conjunction with the National Convention on Sunday, September 23, 2001. The breakfast meeting agenda is full as the Buckeye District rose show trophies as well as the Silver Honor Medal, the Outstanding Judge Award and the Outstanding Consulting

Rosarian Award will be presented. Additionally, members will be asked to vote on the proposed Buckeye District Perpetual Trophy honoring hybridizer, Griffith Buck. The proposed slate that we will be voting on is as follows: President: Steve Pyrak (West Chester); 1st Vice President: Jim Zimmerman (Englewood); and 2nd Vice President: Larry Schock (Van Buren). The current Secretary, Denise Mraz, and the current Treasurer, Dr. Susan Clingenpeel, will remain in their respective positions.

The 2001 edition of the Buckeye District Directory will be available at the district meeting. The directory includes ARS Buckeye District members as well as non-ARS members belonging to local societies. As stated at the Spring District Meeting, one directory will be given to each local society. A small number of directories will be available for purchase at a cost of \$10 each.

In one last effort to grow the ARS Patron Program for 2001, ARS asked that I write a letter to each local society, issuing a challenge, and requesting that they become part of the program. At that time, I became aware that the Buckeye District is not an ARS Patron. In an effort to set an example for the local societies, the District Executive Board and the Committee Chairpersons voted unanimously that the Buckeye District become an ARS Patron. Thank you to all the local societies who met the challenge and became patrons also.

The 3rd Annual All-Miniature Rose Convention was held in Boston, MA, on June 29 – July 1, 2001. It was a wonderful weekend, and I was pleased with the number of Buckeye Rosarians who were able to attend: Jim and Anne Hering, Jim and Barbara Zimmerman, Brian Burley, Gary Barlow, Lew Shupe, Betty Behnken, and Randy and myself. Congratulations to Jim and Anne Hering who won “Queen of the Show” with a beautiful ‘Fairhope’. Next years all-miniature rose conference will be held in Columbus, OH.

On July 28, 2001, the 5th annual Top Gun Meeting was held at the Wegerzyn Horticultural Center in Dayton, OH. A sincere thank you to our weekend hosts, Jim and Barbara Zimmerman, society President, John Adams, and the members of the Miami Valley Rose Society for an outstanding meeting. The program actually began on Friday night at the Zimmerman’s home with refreshments and a garden tour. After the catered meal, Walter LeMire presented a demonstration on budding and air layering. Saturday’s meeting began with the rose show entries. Congratulations to the “Queens of Top Gun” that included: ‘Stainless Steel’ (David Ackers) and ‘Citrus Candy’ (Greg and Rosalie Sanders). After the show, participants divided into three groups to attend grooming technique demonstrations by Walter LeMire, Dr. Paul Klinefelter and John Hefner who shared their secrets for creating the perfect bloom. Next, Walter presented a program on

new exhibition roses. This was the first opportunity for many exhibitors to see the new varieties that they have only heard or read about. After lunch, Dr. Jim Hering moderated a discussion by Jerry Dolph and Dr. James Englert on what judges are looking for when judging the “Queen of Show” and challenge classes. Drs. Gary and Monica Rankin gave an update on the most recently introduced chemicals and advise on using them safely. Jim Zimmerman gave a brief demonstration on dry wrap roses before the potted rose auction began. Thank you, once again this year, to Scott and M.J. Bailey for supplying the roses for the auction. Buckeye Judges Corner

Disqualification and Penalization

Guidelines for Judging Roses reminds us “judging is an art and not a science.” The art is developed by growing roses, exhibiting roses and association with experienced judges.

Guidelines allows a great deal of flexibility since judging is quite subjective, in accordance with “the judge’s aesthetic sense of what is truly beautiful.” There are some rules, however, that must be observed. Yet, even these rules require good judgment on our part.

Nowhere is this more germane than in the area of disqualification and penalization. *Guidelines* states: “Although the two terms are sometimes used indiscriminately, disqualification and penalization have two entirely different meanings. When a rose is disqualified, it is removed from all consideration in judging and cannot possibly receive an award. But when a rose is penalized, it is downgraded because of some fault, and is not removed from competition...A judge must never disqualify an entry that should be penalized, nor merely penalize a specimen that should be disqualified...If there is any question about the certainty of an offense, a judge must never disqualify a specimen...”

Some of the reasons for disqualification are usually clear cut; e.g. 1) Misclassified, 2) Unlabeled or mislabeled, 3) Stem-on-stem, 4) Violation of show rules and 5) Improperly named (not ARS approved exhibition name/AEN). The others – 6) Misplaced, 7) Foreign substance, 8) Not disbudded and 9) Misnamed – require our careful evaluation.

Misplaced – “If the show schedule states that exhibitors are to place their own entries, and an entry is placed in the wrong class, it must be disqualified.” If, however, a placement

committee places the entry incorrectly in spite of a correct entry tag, the mistake should be corrected even if it means rejudging the class.

Foreign substance – If the foreign material is obvious (e.g. a pin, a splint or a Q tip), the entry must be disqualified. But, if a foreign substance is suspected, but not determined with certainty, the entry should be penalized.

Not disbudded – “...a side bud is defined as growth emanating from a leaf axil, having sufficient maturity to display the formation of stem with or without flower buds...” and is subject to disqualification. “The presence of one or two leaflets or leaves at the leaf axil with no evidence of a stem” and “an undeveloped stem, at the leaf axil, lacking leaf or flower bud development” are cause for penalization, not disqualification.

Misnamed – This category offers a greater opportunity for error in judging than any of the others. The *Guidelines* states: “...if the judges are uncertain about the identity (of a specimen) – and there is a remote possibility that the naming is accurate – they can penalize the specimen...never disqualify a specimen.” In our district show in 1988 I entered a ‘Snow Bride’ spray. I had added a generous helping of trace elements containing zinc to my fertilization program that year. ‘Snow Bride’ had a trace of pink on the edge of some of the petals. The two judges (good friends of mine and the best in ARS) disqualified the entry, stating that it was misnamed (I was clerking for them). They made the wrong decision – they should have penalized the entry for not being typical of the variety. However, I, too, was wrong; for as an exhibitor, I should have carefully trimmed off those pink tips as part of

my grooming. My good friend, Mitchie Moe, made the same mistake at a recent ARS national show. Her Jan Shivers Class collection of minis was the best entry in the show. One of the varieties was 'Rise 'n Shine'. In my opinion, the entry should have been penalized, not disqualified. And Mitchie should have trimmed the petals just like I should have. At our local show in Marion this year, I was chairman of judges. A judging team was considering disqualification for an entry of 'Linville' because the center was cream colored (almost

light apricot) instead of white. In my garden, 'Linville' sometimes grows that way. They asked for my opinion, and I suggested penalization rather than disqualification. In the category of Misnamed, both the judges and the exhibitors have a responsibility. The judges should give the exhibitor the benefit of any doubt – and the exhibitor should groom the specimen, if possible, to prevent any doubt in the mind of the judges.

On March 31, 2001, an ARS rose arrangement seminar was held at the Franklin Park Conservatory, Columbus, Ohio. Over 35 persons attended the daylong presentations and workshop on understanding, designing and judging *Arrangements in the Oriental Manner*. Participants responded quite positively to the seminar and requested that consideration be given to holding future ones, following the same format of lecture, demonstration and hands-on work. We are currently looking toward holding future seminars in various geographic regions, with focus given to a multitude of approaches that cover the various traditional, modern and Oriental styles. You are encouraged to send me your ideas for these arrangement seminars and workshops.

Congratulations to the new arrangement judges in the Buckeye District: Terri Lady, Brian Burley, Pat Sommer and Lauren Toth. Each has successfully completed apprenticeship requirements; they are now fully accredited rose arrangement judges and their names can be added to your list of Buckeye District judges.

Rose arrangers from the Buckeye District who exhibited (E), judged (J), or supervised (S) in

the recent national shows are as follows.

Portland Rose Show: Lew Shupe (S) and Gary Barlow (J). **Boston Miniature Rose Show:** Brian Burley (E), Terri Lady (E), Lew Shupe (S) and Gary Barlow (J).

From the national scope, there are three new ARS District Rotating Arrangement Trophies, and they will be awarded for the first time during fall shows in the “home district” of each of the honorees. The **Ruth Tiedeman Trophy** (traditional arrangement) will be awarded in the Illinois-Indiana District, and the **Mildred Bryant Trophy** (miniature arrangement) will be given in the Deep South District. The **Betty Pavey Trophy** (modern arrangement) will be given for the first time at the ARS National Show in Cleveland, 2001. Any ARS member can compete for these trophies. We are honored to be the first district to award the Betty Pavey Trophy. In succeeding years it will travel to each of the 18 districts on a systematic rotating schedule. This award is named for Betty, who won countless local, district and national arrangement awards, and with her husband Hugh “Doc” Pavey, won numerous local, district and national horticultural trophies. Betty was an exemplary arranger of artistic designs, and was instrumental in helping many

of us, with advice and encouragement, which were new to rose arranging. Her book, titled *Say It With Roses*, was a comprehensive work on designing with roses, and was a major reference for rose arrangers everywhere. For that reason, this award is named the Betty Pavey "Say It With Roses" Trophy. Judy L'Amoureux funded this award in honor of her mother, and will be in attendance, along with other family members, at the dinner banquet in Cleveland when the trophy is presented.

Reminder: For each local society that is including an ARS arrangement schedule in your

local rose shows, remember to send the schedule to me in plenty of time for review. You may send a copy by E-mail if you wish; however, also send a back-up hard copy by mail in case the E-mail is unclear.

Please let me know if your society would like suggestions, advice or assistance regarding arrangements – schedules, programs or projecting toward the future. I will be happy to serve as a reference as you plan your programs in the years ahead.

Year of the Rose – 2002

In 2002 the Buckeye District of the American Rose Society will embark on a special adventure as they participate in the American Rose Society project titled the "Year of the Rose – 2002".

We will use the remainder of the year 2001 to prepare for this exciting celebration to increase public awareness of the Rose "America's Floral Emblem, symbol of Love, Friendship, Beauty and Peace". The United States Senate and House passed the proclamation declaring 2002 the year of the rose. An official signing will take place in the Whitehouse Rose Garden at a later date.

Our goal is to spread the information throughout the communities within which our district members reside heralding the message that the Rose is our National Floral Emblem. This will be accomplished by the creative involvement of all local clubs within the Buckeye Region as they move out into their communities with educational programs and beautification programs featuring the rose. Offer to present a program to the local garden clubs, arboretums, and civic clubs as a means of encouraging them to develop a rose garden or enhance a public area with roses. Contact the Mayor of your city

and ask him/her to designate 2002 as the "Year of the Rose".

The month of June is referred to as the "Rose Month". Include your local library as your 2002 activity for June. Contact your library NOW so that they can place this activity on their schedule. Create an Educational exhibit featuring Roses and place it in your local library. Select rose books from the library shelves and place them with your display. Free literature to enhance your display is available from the American Rose Society (address and E-mail listed below). Discuss the possibility of offering a program for children on roses and rose gardens. Put potted miniature roses or cut specimens on various desks in the library. Be sure to have your clubs membership brochure as a hand out with your exhibit. Include a miniature rose on a table in the children's section of the library with a flyer telling them that the Rose is a very special flower for it is their National Floral Emblem. Suggest a story hour featuring the rose.

Every club president has received a copy of the flyer "Libraries and Roses", the proclamation form for the City Mayors signature, "Roses for

Good Will” flyer, Veterans and Roses and a suggested Time Line of Activities.

A Buckeye District Certificate will be awarded at the 2002 Fall meeting to the clubs who send in a picture of their library exhibits with a brief write up describing how each was developed – did the participating club gain any new club members etc. and its overall success in educating the public that the Rose is our National Flower. Participating clubs must mail this information to the Buckeye District YOTR Chairman, Pet Newill, 10245 Virginia Lee Drive, Dayton, OH 45458-4424 before August

30, 2002. The photos will be returned. Participating clubs will be featured in a display (using the photo’s received by this chairman) at the Fall Buckeye District meeting in 2002.

Griffith Buck Roses

“A rose is a rose is a rose...except after an Iowa winter, and then it’s very likely dead.”

Dr. Griffith Buck, an Iowa State alumnus and horticulture professor from 1948 to 1985, spent his lifetime remedying that problem. During his tenure at Iowa State University, Buck developed more than 85 varieties of roses that were hardy enough to thrive in the Midwest’s tough summers and even tougher winters. Most Buck roses are hardy to zone 4 or colder. Hot summer sun does not discourage growth, and resistance to most common diseases contributes to healthy foliage. The shrubs are either spreading or upright, with large blooms that are similar in form to hybrid teas. Available in many sizes and colors, re-bloom is very good, with one cycle of blooming following another quickly on most varieties.

Only a small number of Buck’s roses were presented to ISURF to be patented. Two varieties, ‘Carefree Beauty’ and ‘Prairie Princess,’ had some commercial success. Fortunately, Buck gave other varieties to friends, neighbors and other rosarians, which ensured most survived. Many of Buck’s roses

were named after his friends. In fact, ‘Dorcas’ was named after a television reporter on the Iowa State University’s television station (WOI-TV).

Buck, a respected member of the rose growers association and the rose growing community, was renowned for his dedication to the industry. After his retirement, however, little effort was made to market his roses or even to maintain the stock. Buck died in 1991, but his widow, Ruby, and daughter, Mary, are helping to preserve his legacy.

The Buck roses are the proprietary property of the Iowa State University Research Foundation. In honor of Griffith Buck’s accomplishment, a collection of his roses has been established at the Reiman Gardens in Ames, Iowa, under the supervision of former student, Nick Howell. An effort is under way to establish a complete set of Buck roses at the garden according to Julie Gustafson, program assistant in the Office of Intellectual Property and Technology Transfer. Located at the south edge of the main rose garden, Buck roses were planted in groups of three to six of each variety. On the other side of the modern roses is a bed of old garden roses

inter-planted with more of Griffith Buck's shrubs. In addition to the roses, an herb garden with a large variety of herbs was planted. Below the rose gardens on a lower level are thousands of annuals and perennials.

As people's lives get busier, interest in Buck's "lazy man's roses" has grown enormously. A

website (www.ag.iastate.edu/centers/cad/rose1/html) devoted to Buck roses have been developed providing information on distributors as well as detailed descriptions on varieties. A complete variety listing along with color photographs are also available for the following Buck roses:

In the artistic design section, Marily Young from Illinois won the Ralph S. Moore ARS National Challenge Trophy with a beautiful line-mass arrangement. Young also won the ARS Gold Certificate for a line arrangement using 'Glowing Amber'. The ARS Silver Certificate was won by Lois Fowkes (New York), for a modern "underground" arrangement in a class titled *The Big Dig* using 'Irresistible'. Interesting and educational presentations included "On Being a Mini Rose Enthusiast," by Sean McCann, and "New Roses From an Olde

Country," by Gerta Gray. A program titled "The Good, the Bad, and the Bugly" included a slide presentation by Rich Baer. After lunch, panelists John and Holly Saville, Mike and Betty Williams, Dennis and Suzy Bridges, and Frank and June Benardella played "The Mini-Wed Game" hosted by moderator, Dr. Tommy Cairns.

At the awards banquet, Royal National Rose Society Past President, Mike Roberts, was the keynote speaker. It was announced that two miniatures were inducted into the ARS Miniature Hall of Fame: 'Jeanne LaJoie' and 'Green Ice'.
