At the conclusion of the seminars, three lucky attendees received a one-year ARS membership to take back to their local society. As a result, the Buckeye District welcomes Rebecca Ashenfelter of the Toledo RS, John Adams of the Miami Valley RS and Kenneth E. Lehner of the Garden Club of Marion as new ARS members. My sincere thanks to each of our speakers for their help in making the seminar a success.

The following day, we had another full agenda for the Buckeye District Spring Meeting. Featured speaker and guest, ARS Executive Director, Benny Ellerbe, gave an informative program on the status of the American Rose Society. At the conclusion of the program,

Klima Campaign Chairman, Dr. Jim Hering, presented a \$1500 donation to Benny from the Buckeye District. Tom Herr spoke on "Roses for the Landscape – Shrub Roses". After lunch and the Buckeye District business meeting, Randy Lady presented the results of the district photography contest. Congratulations to Paul Jerabek for his winning entry. Brian Burley gave a hands on demonstration on watering systems in "Water, Water, Water and a Little Soil". Thank you to everyone who participated in the meeting and especially Bruce DeLong for his fund raising efforts.

On April 24, 2004, Consulting Rosarian Chair Tom Wood held a CR Audit and School at Fellow Riverside Gardens in Youngstown. As a result, five new Consulting Rosarians were added to the Buckeye list: Richard Anthony, Robert Fausnaugh, Patricia Martinec, Anita Solarz and William Solarz. Congratulations to each of you and thanks to our hosts, the Mahoning Valley Rose Society and the school faculty.

In early May, I attended the ARS Spring National Convention in San Diego. The hotel grounds featured more than 600 rose bushes planted by the San Diego Rose Society. At the Board of Director's business meeting a number of items were discussed and approved: 1) A new ARS certificate for "Most Fragrant Rose"

will be available in time for fall rose shows. The class, to be judged by ARS judges, is open to any type of rose, one bloom per stem, no side buds. The bloom shall be judged on fragrance (70%) and appearance (30%). 2) A three-year, \$5000 research project in cooperation with Oregon State University to research the pherology and control of rose midge. 3) Two new national arrangement trophies will be added in 2005. The J. Benjamin Williams Mini-Flora Arrangement Trophy will be presented at the All-Miniature Rose Show and the Russ Anger National Trophy will be available at Spring National Conventions. 4) Sites for future National All-Miniature Rose Shows were approved (Indianapolis, IN – 2005 and York Haven, PA – 2006). 5) ARS will provide information on roses to the Green Industry Yellow Pages web site to educate and inform consumers.

Also at the San Diego convention, Dr. Lew Shupe was awarded the Klima Medal for excellence in education. Lew's Klima Lecture entitled "Teachable Moments" was presented at the members meeting on Saturday. Congratulations and thank you for many years of dedication and service.

Randy and I, along with Jim Hering traveled to Texas in early June for the 6th Annual ARS Miniature Rose Show and Conference. We had a wonderful time meeting up with old friends, attending lectures and exhibiting in the show. Congratulations to Randy for winning the ARS National Ralph S. Moore Arrangement Trophy. On Sunday we toured the Fort Worth Botanic Center and the Clark Gardens and enjoyed a barbeque lunch.

On Monday, we (Jim Hering, ARS Vice President, Steve Jones, George Hartley, Randy and I) traveled to Shreveport for the Klima Educational and Visitors Center Groundbreaking. Buckeye Judges' Corner

Jeff Wyckoff, the ARS National Chairman of Horticulture Judging, has initiated a periodic publication for disseminating judging information, titled *Judges' Journal*. The *Journal* will be sent to each district judging chairman by E-mail, and I will then forward it to each Buckeye District Judge, providing that I have your e-mail address. Check the judges' list

in this issue; if your e-mail address is not listed or is incorrect, please contact me. The first issue of the *Journal* deals in part with questions, which have arisen regarding three sections of the new *Guidelines and Rules for Judging Roses* – Rules for Disqualification, Mini-Floras and "Found" Roses. The following is copied from the *Journal*:

Rules for Disqualification (Chapter IV, pages 9-16)

Presumably, the 9 reasons for disqualification were changed to rules to ensure their uniform and evenhanded application – so judges could not simply choose which they wished to enforce and which they did not. Disqualifications are obviously a touchy subject, and I'm sure we have all encountered problems concerning their application.

Despite the Guidelines repeated emphasis on positive judging, I believe that too many of our judges use disqualifications as a crutch or a culling tool, something that enables them to reduce the number of specimens they then must "positively" judge. However, I also question whether a rigid application of these 9 reasons for DQ is in the best interest of our local society shows, most of which do not operate at the same level of competitiveness and intensity, or even with the same educational philosophy, as do our National and District shows. Do the rules for disqualification mean that entries in the Junior, the Novice, and even the closed, local-society sections of those shows that choose to use them, should be treated the same as entries in a National show? If so, does this serve the best interests of the local society, and consequently of the ARS as a whole? The entire question of disqualifications will be

revisited by the Horticultural Judging Committee during the coming year; until then, the rules remain rules.

Some comments on the nine reasons for disqualification:

Misnamed As in the old Guidelines, this reads: “If all agree the variety is not correctly named on the tag, but the judges cannot correctly name it, (my emphasis), disqualification is still in order.” Some of our judges apparently believe that in order to disqualify, the judging teams must be able to correctly name the variety in question. This is not true. If you can definitely, or even approximately, identify the variety, it would be a service to the exhibitor to write this on the tag, along with the reason for disqualification. However, this is not a requirement.

Improperly Named The subject of “found” roses will be discussed later. With regard to the list of official ARS publications, it is the responsibility of the Chairman of Judges for any show to have these on hand for consultation, to include:

- The latest edition of the Official List of Approved Exhibition Names Note: the 2004 Official List is scheduled for publishing in April.
- Printouts of the registrations recorded on the website since publication of the O.L and/or copies of the American Rose’ registration columns. Since website entries usually precede those in the magazine, a website printout should suffice. Note: website entries will soon be scan-able by date.

The Guidelines specify that varieties become eligible for exhibition 30 days after their date of publication. However, Marily Young and Phil Schorr, Registration Co-Chairs, and I have concluded that this requirement affects only the variety’s registration and not its ARS-assigned Approved Exhibition Name. Thus, pending review by the ARS Board of Directors, roses may be exhibited as soon as they appear in an official ARS publication.

Foreign Substance Note the final sentence: “This disqualification also applies to exhibition aids accidentally left in or on the exhibit.” Again, some judges are of the opinion that a cotton ball or q-tip should not be a DQ offence since it was not deliberately left there to improve the appearance of the specimen, at least during the judging thereof. This new sentence should dispel that interpretation.

Not Disbudded With regard to “side buds”, please note the definition: “having sufficient maturity to display the formation of a stem, with or without a flower bud (my emphasis). Illustrations #4 and 5 on pp. 14 & 15 give examples of stem and no stem. For side growth that falls somewhere between these two examples, the judge should use their best judgment as to whether “sufficient maturity” is present.

Violation of Show Rules Under the old Guidelines, ARS ribbons were considered ARS awards only for National and District shows; under the new, they are to be considered ARS awards for local shows as well. Related to this matter are the sentences contained in “Guidelines for Operating Rose Shows Under ARS standards (p.82):

Para. 2: “All rose shows operating under American Rose Society standards will (my emphasis) offer ARS awards.”

Para 1: “The purpose of this section is to present guidelines and procedures... suggested (my emphasis) for local shows eligible for ARS awards.

At issue here is to what degree the ARS should impose its own guidelines and/or rules on the operation, schedule, and show rules of a local affiliated society. Again, I offer the rationale that the prime concern of most local society shows is to fill the tables with blooms and put on a good educational display, not necessarily to hand out trophies and ARS certificates. In pursuit of this goal, let us suppose a local society decides to allow exhibitors to enter more than one specimen of the same variety in the hort. classes, or even more than one entry in a challenge class. Is this so wrong? Since judges have been directed not to judge classes that offer ARS awards but do not follow ARS guidelines for that award, or else to judge these classes by national rather than local rules, societies have managed to sidestep this restriction by not offering ARS awards, i.e. an ARS certificate, for those classes to which they wished to apply local rules. Now it seems that the ARS has upped the ante by declaring [ARS] ribbons to be ARS awards.

I think we run a real risk of alienating our local societies and discouraging ARS membership by trying to micromanage and dictate how they will run their shows. As a consequence of this latest dictum, I expect that local show chairs will point out that, per paragraph #1 above, national guidelines and procedures are only suggested for local shows, and should they decide, for example, to allow multiple entries of the same variety by an exhibitor in the hort. section, they will simply evade this guideline by not using ARS ribbons in their show.

Judging Mini-Flora Specimens **Chapter IX, pp. 47-51**

The entire chapter on Mini-Floras seems to have been constructed on the assumption that a significant majority of blooms being classified (or reclassified) into this category would be, in effect, small floribundas. The opening statement, “Mini-Flora rose blooms are usually larger than miniatures and are judged by the same general criteria as miniatures.” is contradicted by the body of the text, which devotes three pages to judging Mini-flora sprays, generally along the lines of floribundas (para. 2, p. 49 refers to Mini-Floras as “cluster-flowered roses), and only a short paragraph to one-bloom-per-stem exhibits. In reality, almost the entire Mini-Flora class to date has been comprised of larger-than-normal (both bloom and plant) miniatures. To my knowledge, virtually none of the patio roses or low-growing shrubs so popular in Europe over the last 10-15 years have been reclassified as Mini-Floras.

Compounding the problem is the allowance that the Mini-Floras may be tucked in with the Miniatures (while being judged along floribunda lines) at local shows, setting up more conflicts regarding size, balance and proportion, etc. Until the Hort. Judging Committee can revisit the entire Mini-Flora chapter, I going to propose the best way to handle this class is as follows:

- If Mini-Floras are combined with Miniatures in any show, meaning that they are competing for the same awards, they should be judged according to the standards for judging Miniatures. Most importantly, this means that the 10 points normally awarded for size for a specimen should be disregarded and miniature language, “in judging the element of size, typicality of variety is of prime importance” [p. 54’ applied.
- If Mini-Floras are set off as a separate section with their own awards, with or without a Court of Honor, then they may have the normal standards of 10 point for size applied. However, I would suggest that the standard to be used should be clearly spelled out in the local show rules.

- These judging standards, based upon whether Mini-Floras are a separate or a combined group, should apply to sprays as well as one-bloom-per-stem exhibits. Again, if they are separate and your show wishes to judge them by floribunda standards i.e. with bloom size being a factor, then so state in the show schedule.
- Since, due to lack of funds and/or an individual sponsor, there are currently no separate ARS certificates for Mini-Floras at the local or the District level, the Guidelines' requirement that "In...district shows, individual Mini-Flora classes are to be provided" will be held in abeyance until such time as certificates become available.

"Found" Roses (Chapter IV, p. 10)

The following item is scheduled to appear in the FYI column of the April American Rose magazine. For those of you whose shows will take place before the 2004 Official List... comes out, any rose appearing in MRXI or the 2002 OL is exhibitible.

The new Guidelines and Rules for Judging Roses states that "found" roses must be listed in an official ARS publication showing an accepted AEN for them to be exhibited in a class for which ARS ribbons or certificates are awarded. A listing in the Combined Rose List, wherein "found" roses are indicated by their placement in quotation marks, i.e. "Kathy's Hunter's Pink", is not sufficient for their exhibition.

This rule needs further clarification to avoid debate over its meaning. In past ARS publications, including Modern Roses XI and the 2002 Official List of Approved Exhibition Names, many such "found" roses were transferred from the CRL listings, unfortunately without any indication of their "found" status. In order to be consistent, we should disallow all those past listings and look forward instead, stating that "found" roses can only be exhibited in classes carrying ARS awards if they are specifically listed in future ARS publications which make it clear they can be exhibited in these classes.

The new 2004 Official List is now available, "found" roses have been removed from its listings, and it thus supercedes all previous ARS publications as the source for determining if a cultivar may be exhibited in classes carrying ARS awards.

A special group has been established to review "found" roses for future publications. Darlow's Enigma is the first "found" rose to receive this approval as a unique cultivar; it may be shown in the Classic Shrub class along with all other hybrid musks. There have also been a few "found" roses that have been identified as another cultivar. Caldwell Pink must now be shown as Pink Pet, Katy Road Pink must be shown as Carefree Beauty, and J. Otto Ripoff must be shown as Lady Mary Fitzwilliam.

If you are growing a "found" rose and you believe it is unique, or conversely if you believe it to be synonymous with an existing cultivar, and would like it to be reviewed, please contact the American Rose Society with the particulars and your suggestion will be handled.

A Consulting Rosarian Audit will be held on Saturday, September 18, 2004, in conjunction with the Buckeye District Fall Rose Show and Conference in Mason, Ohio. Consulting Rosarians are reminded that 2004 is the final

year for current CRs, certified in 2000, to be re-certified. You will no longer be “grand fathered” and must now meet the criteria as stated in the *CR Manual*. To avoid being dropped from active status, those needing re-certification credit should plan to attend this audit. If you are unsure of your current status, contact CR Chair, Tom Wood for additional information.

If an individual or local society are interested in hosting a Consulting Rosarian Audit or School in the late fall or early winter, please contact Tom as soon as possible.

In San Diego, the ARS Board of Directors approved a new accreditation level for Consulting Rosarians. “Master Rosarians” would be recommended and submitted by local societies for CRs who have served for at least 10 years, and performed at a superior level. District CR Chair, Tom Wood, will be contacting each local society with additional information, as it becomes available.
