From the Director...

It's wonderful to see the first roses of spring begin to bloom. The cool, wet weather of May slowed growth somewhat, but the recent warming trend has resulted in abundant growth and brightly colored blooms. As we become busier at this time of year in the garden and with related activities, remember to take time to stop and enjoy our roses.

From many reports received, attendees seemed to enjoy our recent spring Buckeye District meeting, held at Franklin Park Conservatory on April 1. It was a busy day with a number of activities, and my thanks to everyone who helped make this meeting a success. John Mattia, guest speaker, gave an informative program on his approach to growing roses. John advocates the liberal use of compost in the rose beds, and gave his expert opinion on new

varieties available for exhibition. Sharene Rausch of The Scotts Company spoke on new products from *Ortho*, and how to use them safely. Moderator Jerry Dolph and his panel of experts including John Mattia, Bob Choate, Jim Zimmerman and Jerry McCarthy answered the questions that rose growers really wanted to know.

The day before the spring meeting, Dr. Gary Barlow, with the help of Dr. Lew Shupe, conducted a rose arrangement seminar devoted to arrangements in the Oriental Manner. Attendees received instruction on the various styles and were then able to construct their own arrangements. Thank you to those arrangers who left their creations on display for the Sunday meeting. Also, on Saturday, Dr. Jim Hering held a rose judging seminar for those

needing to fulfill their audit requirement. Both seminars were well attended.

The ARS convention and rose show in Portland, OR is now past. It was a good meeting and I was pleased with the number of Buckeye rosarians who were able to attend: Jim and Anne Hering, Bill and Peg Newill, Jim and Barbara Zimmerman, Gary Barlow, Carol Belko, John Kuzma, Lew Shupe, Randy and myself all made the trip. The ARS rose show was staged beautifully by color class, not alphabetically as we usually see in the Buckeye District, and was held in a mall ice skating rink. A partial list of winners can be found elsewhere in the bulletin.

At the Board of Director's business meeting a number of items were discussed and approved: 1) The requests from the Tulsa Rose Society to host the Fall 2004 National Convention in Tulsa, Oklahoma, and the Charleston Lowcountry Rose Society to host the 5th National Miniature Show and Conference in Charleston, South Carolina were accepted. 2) Three ARS District Rotating Arrangement Trophies (The Ruth Tiedeman Trophy, The Betty Pavey Trophy and The Mildred Bryant Trophy) were approved. The Betty Pavey Trophy for a modern arrangement will be offered for the first time at the Fall National Convention in Cleveland. 3) The Board also approved two additional national trophies: The President's Trophy, open to members who grow no more than 50 rose bushes, and The Garden Web Rose Forum Best in Show Trophy, for the best horticultural entry on the trophy table. These trophies will be awarded at both the Spring and Fall National Conventions. 4) Districts having more than 1500 ARS members may now present multiple awards for the Silver Honor Medal, the Outstanding Consulting Rosarian Award, and the Outstanding Judges Award. Currently, the Buckeye District falls short of the required 1500 ARS members needed to present multiple awards. 5) Names of winners for the 2000 Bulletin Awards Competition were announced. Among the

Award of Merit Certificate Winners for articles in publication was Mame Koster for her *Buckeye Rose Bulletin* article "In Memory Of Brigid, Lessons For Life". Congratulations Mame!

It was also announced that the United States Senate and House passed the proclamation declaring 2002 the year of the rose. The official signing will take place in the Whitehouse Rose Garden at a later date. A number of activities are in the planning stage to promote all aspects of the rose. A speaker's bureau is being developed to present programs across the nation at Home Depot stores. Anyone wishing to participate by speaking at a local Home Depot should contact Pet Newill or myself.

The fifth annual Top Gun meeting of the Buckeye District will be held on Saturday, July 28, 2001, in Dayton. The meeting is sponsored by the Miami Valley Rose Society and will be held at the Wegerzyn Horticultural Center. It promises to be an informative day with a number of guest speakers, a garden tour, and rose show. For more information, contact Jim Zimmerman at (937) 836-4703.

The completed forms should reach Lyman by September 26, 2001, so that he can begin the time consuming tallying process and submit results to ARS. Do it today before you forget!

Mark on your calendars the dates of the next ARS National Convention: September 20-24, in Cleveland, Ohio. The folks in Cleveland have been working long and hard preparing for this national event and I encourage all Buckeye rosarians to attend. There will be something for everyone: rose show, garden tours, informative speakers, dinner cruise, and the chance to meet rosarians from across the country. The Buckeye

District Business Meeting will be held on Sunday, September 23, 2001. Don't forget to bring any Buckeye District Trophies that you may have won at last year's show. Contact 2nd Vice President, Jim Zimmerman, if you have any questions.

The Buckeye District lost a great rosarian when Bill Hutchman, of Marion, passed away on June 13, 2001. Bill was a long time member of the

Marion Garden Club and the Central Ohio Rose Society. An exhibitor, writer and lecturer, Bill was awarded the Silver Honor Medal in 1998, and ten years earlier, the Outstanding Consulting Rosarian Award. Bill's willingness to help others and his passion for roses will be missed by all.

Buckeye Judges Corner

The horticulture judging seminar held at Franklin Park Conservatory on March 31st, the day before the Buckeye District Spring Meeting, was attended by 32 rosarians; 19 Buckeye judges, 4 Great Lakes judges, 2 apprentices, and 7 auditors. This included 9 of the 10 Buckeye judges whose seminar requirement was due this year. I am indebted to Terri and Randy Lady, John Dickman and Lew Shupe who served with me on the faculty and were responsible for making the seminar a success.

Notes from the seminar:

Ethics

1. Don't bad-mouth roses during the judging process.
2. Be helpful in training apprentices.
3. NEVER TOUCH A BLOOM.

OGR's

1. The Genesis Award is for the best species rose. Species roses are not eligible for Dowager Queen if the Genesis Award is offered.

Mini-Floras

1. Eligible for Mini Queen, King, Princess and Court.

Challenge Classes

1. Specimens may not be touched or moved.
2. The bud in Cycle of Bloom must have sepals down with petals just beginning to unfurl.

Seedling Class

1. Judge also on "originality".

2. For amateur hybridizers, not for unnamed commercial roses.

In the May issue of the American Rose, President Cairns in his column describes the four year seminar requirement for judges as "unnecessary bureaucratic oversight." He suggests that "we should abandon such strict monitoring practices" since "it is the regular practice of skill that merits importance." Unfortunately, measurement of a judges skill and assurance that skill is practiced are not possible. The American Rose Society has an obligation to its exhibitors and to the public to provide accredited judges for rose shows who are current in judging rules and techniques. All professional disciplines require documented continuing education for maintenance of certification or accreditation as one measure to assure quality. Perhaps the seminar requirement could be relaxed to every six years, but I would not favor its repeal. Please contact me, Terri Lady and Gary Barlow with your opinion.

The Buckeye District currently has 49 Accredited Judges and 6 Apprentices. Since we are always in need of more judges, I hope that some of the seminar auditors as well as some of our exhibitors who are not judges, will decide to attend judging school and become accredited. Dave and Edna Edwards, formerly of Marion, have recently moved back to Ohio from Florida where they have been living for the past two decades. They are both accredited horticulture

judges and are residing in Delaware. They would like to resume judging in our district; feel free to contact them for your shows (100 Willowbrook Way S. #2012, Delaware, OH 43015, 740/368-4568).

I want to thank all of our horticulture judges for sending me their annual report forms. We had 100% compliance.

I regret to report that the new Guidelines for Judging Roses will not be published this year.

The National Judging Committee has decided to make further revisions. I will keep you updated.

The 5th annual Buckeye District Top Gun Meeting will be held in Dayton on Saturday, July 28, 2001. The meeting will be of interest to all exhibitors, thus, to all judges. I encourage you to attend. If not in Dayton, I hope to see you in Cleveland in September at the 2001 ARS Fall National Convention which is also our Buckeye District Fall Meeting.

Cleveland Rose Arrangement Seminar

Arrangement Workshop for Beginners

Presenters: Lew Shupe and ARS Arrangement Judges

A two-hour workshop limited to beginner arrangers. Goal: A participatory workshop for prospective arrangers who want to learn basic procedures for doing rose arrangements. Participants will have the opportunity to learn the styles and mechanics for creating a traditional arrangement. Floral material will be provided for each participant to complete an arrangement. Limited to 30 participants (registration at the Conference). Participants attending the workshop will need to bring scissors, or shears.

Advanced Arrangement Seminar

Presenters: Steve House and ARS Arrangement Judges

A two-hour seminar for ARS accredited judges and other experienced arrangers. Goal: Evaluating criteria for judging miniature arrangements in ARS national, district and local rose shows, with an emphasis on scale and proportion. Discussion is focused on the use of currently "larger" miniature and mini-flora roses within the 10" format. Demonstrations of miniature traditional, modern, Oriental, dried, and table classes, as well as point scoring that are unique to miniature arrangements. (2 hours of audit credit)

A Symphony of Roses

JUNE

1. Continue the spray program and water the plants. If it doesn't rain, use the hose and city water.
2. Admire your work. The spring flush of bloom is here.
3. If you exhibit, a stem length six times the bloom height is desirable. The stem will be 16 to 24-inches long. Miniature roses require a shorter stem in proportion to the bloom.
4. Fertilize the roses every two to three weeks. If a granular or organic product is used, water before and after applications. If a water-soluble fertilizer such as *RapidGro* is used, extra moisture is not needed to get the food to the root zone.
5. Make someone happy. Share your roses.
6. Now is the time to root cuttings under milk jugs.

JULY

1. Continue the spray program and watering the plants. Roses need more water in the hot summer months. Do not allow the soil to dry out. To avoid foliage burn, spray in the morning or evening.
2. Another application of manure or alfalfa tea will enhance root development. The tea can be fortified with 2-cups full of urea or similar granular fertilizer in a 30-gallon container.
3. Remove small growth from the center of the bush, but allow maximum leaf and cane development to stay on the bush. This promotes plant growth. Always

allow basil breaks, which sprout from the crown or knot, to mature.

4. Continue to fertilize every two to three weeks.
5. Plants can be pruned to bloom at a specific time. Most hybrid tea varieties cycle every 40 days. A heavy petaled variety like 'Uncle Joe' will take 55-days. It is possible to get staggered bloom times on a single bush with prudent pruning. Floribunda varieties cycle about every 45-days. Weather conditions can vary the bloom cycle a couple of days.
6. If you want blooms on a certain date, it is necessary to prune at the appropriate time to achieve the objective.
7. Pruning also helps to shape the bush. Prune ¼-inch above an eye, which is where a leaflet grows from the cane. Pruning to an outside eye allows the bush to spread. Inside eye pruning promotes taller canes. The new growth will be about the same size as the cane that was pruned. There are exceptions. A very large cane will not produce the exact same size new growth.
8. Watch for spider mites on the lower leaves near the ground. They develop on the underside of the leaf and must be controlled with spray or washed away with a water wand. Otherwise, the mites will move up the plant and restrict growth as the foliage turns brown and falls away.

AUGUST

1. Continue the spray and fertilizer program and water frequently. A light sprinkle, either natural or from a hose,

cools the foliage on hot days but does not provide adequate moisture to the root zone. Blackspot will not develop on the leaves if the moisture dries within 8-hours.

2. If you want roses on a specific date, prune accordingly.
3. Later in the month when the temperature turns cooler at night, mildew on the plant will develop at a quicker pace. It attacks the tender new growth first. A regular spray program will keep mildew in check. However, some varieties such as 'First Prize', 'Nightingale', 'Crystalline' and most florist varieties will need special attention with a more frequent spray program.
4. If the soil is hard and compacted, aerate it with a pitchfork and the roots won't be injured. This will allow more water and air to reach the root zone and allow the roots to grow freely.
5. If you exhibit, identify the choice canes and treat them as noted in the month of May.

SEPTEMBER

1. Continue the spray and water program, but quit fertilizing around the middle of the month.
2. Enjoy the beautiful roses and perhaps the best bloom of the year.
3. Share your roses with friends. Take a few blooms to a rose show or the fair where many people can enjoy them.

OCTOBER

1. Continue to spray and water until several hard freezes take place.

2. Many nice flowers will be available to cut as roses are survivors and will withstand short periods of cold weather.
3. This is the best time to build new rose beds and tune up older beds by spading in aged manure and existing mulch cover.
4. A soil test is appropriate at this time for the meticulous gardener. Lime or sulfur can be applied to adjust the pH.
5. Order the rose catalogs and determine the new varieties you will want next year.

NOVEMBER

1. Consider trimming tall growing roses to waist high. This will prevent winter wind damage to the plant.
2. A little winter protection will help all of the roses to survive the cold winter and the tender yellow and white varieties will love it. Wood chips or shredded bark works well and should be applied several inches high around the crown and /or graft area of the plant. The protection will serve as mulch in the spring and summer. Soil also works very well, but it should be brought in and not used from the existing bed. It is important not to expose the feeder roots of the plant to the cold winter. Foam cones also do an excellent job of protecting the plant, but straw provides very little protection. Cover miniature roses with shredded oak leaves.

DECEMBER

1. The holiday season is near and it is time for a vacation from the garden. Roses for delivery in the spring make great Christmas gifts.
2. Pray for snow, as it is the best winter insulation and protection for the roses.
