Heritage, (David Austin's best), Hawkeye Belle(will brown a little in wet weather), Marquesa Boucella, Mary Rose, Stanwell Perpetual, Agnes, Applejack, Westerland, Dortmund, The Gift, William Baffin, John Cabot, John Davis, R. rugosa alba, Carefree Wonder.
